

At Our Last Meeting: Decorative Wood Inlay with John Koch

John Koch from Cape Girardeau, MO became an orthopedic surgeon even though his interest test in high school said he would be a great cabinetmaker.

John was first attracted to Kentucky or Pennsylvania rifles, mostly because of the embellishments on the fancier models. He taught himself how to build rifles and how to add the fancy details. At the same time he became interested in powder horns that went with the rifles. He was introduced to the lathe to make plugs for the ends of the powder horns. His first effort produced large chunks with scary results that led him to do his lathe work with rasps instead of traditional turning tools.

He ran into Marc Adams at a woodworking show. He went to a weekend class at Marc adams to learn how to do turning better. After he learned to do turnings he started to use the same techniques he used on rifles to make his turnings fancier.

John turns pepper mills and bowls that he then adds silver and other materials to add color.

Steven Hatcher taught John how to do stone dust inlay to add even more color. The stone is ground up and then dyed to a desired color.

John first measures the circumference and then divides the length by the number of design repeats to get his spacing. He then transfers the design to the piece to give him an idea of where the inlay will be. For petals, John cuts thin sheets of silver to shape and then uses a hammer to pound the petal into the wood, which leaves an imprint. John then chisels out the wood behind and glues the silver in place. For the middle of the flowers John drills small holes and then fills the voids with stone dust and CA glue.

To make the line patterns, John uses small curved chisels to make small grooves to receive thin ribbons of silver. John finishes the lines with small dots on the ends that he creates by pounding in round wire end first, like a nail.

After everything is inserted and glued, John uses rasps to remove the bulk of the metal

and finishes with sandpaper to remove the burrs on the metal.

For a finish, John likes to seal the surface with shellac and then finish with multiple coats of lacquer from a spray can. For more porous woods, like walnut, John uses Z-poxy to fill the pores to make a glass smooth surface.


